
Recent Improvements at Rex





A trench was dug to install better drain lines from the vacuum area and 389-399 tanks to the tower and waste water pits and also to install cooling lines from 952 chiller to 389-399 tanks.


GO TO POT - Any farm animal that had outlived its usefulness, such as a hen that no longer laid eggs, would literally go to pot. It was cooked and eaten.

How To Lift

Correct back, leg, shoulder and knee posture is vital to prevent strains and pressure on joints and muscles that provide support during weight-bearing activities and general movement. According to the Cleveland Clinic, the thigh and lower leg bones are protected with proper knee posture. Arthritis, fatigue and injuries can be reduced or eliminated with proper knee alignment.

When you lift objects, use the following suggestions to protect against injury.

- Before you lift a heavy object, make sure you have firm footing.
- To pick up an object that is lower than the level of your waist, keep your back straight and bend at your knees and hips. Do not bend forward at the waist with your knees straight.



- Stand with a wide stance close to the object you are trying to pick up and keep your feet firm on the ground. Tighten your stomach muscles and lift the object using your leg muscles. Straighten your knees in a steady motion. Don't jerk the object up to your body.
- Stand completely upright without twisting. Always move your feet forward when lifting an object.
- If you are lifting an object from a table, slide it to the edge to the table so that you can hold it close to your body. Bend your knees so that you are close to the object. Use your legs to lift the object and come to a standing position.
- Avoid lifting heavy objects above waist level.
- Hold packages close to your body with your arms bent. Keep your stomach muscles tight. Take small steps and go slowly.
- To lower the object, place your feet as you did to lift, tighten stomach muscles and bend your hips and knees.
