

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New Year Struts in with the Philadelphia Mummers Parade

One of the most popular New Year's Celebrations in Philadelphia is the Mummers Parade held every year on New Year's Day. This spectacular event includes over 10,000 marchers,. It begins at 15th and Market near Dilworth Park for the judging then moves down to City Hall. The parade then travels south where it ends at Broad Street and Washington Avenue.

There are four divisions with multiple clubs in each division: Comic, Fancy, Fancy Brigade, and String Band. They all compete for cash prizes based on their performances. Comic division clubs lampoon modern day local and national political and social themes. The Fancy division clubs wear large, ornate costumes, and perform with floats and props. The Fancy Brigade division clubs also wear large, ornate costumes, and perform intricate dances and drills with elaborate props.

The String Band division, the largest in the parade with 18 member clubs, wear brilliant feathered and sequined costumes like the Fancy and Fancy Brigade divisions, and also drill and perform while playing musical instruments. Parade rules do not permit the use of brass instruments in a String Band; the instrumentation is exclusively saxophones, banjos, accordions, violins, bass violins, and percussion instruments. One of the first String Band clubs was Trilby, that first paraded in 1902 and is still in existence today.

Traditionally, band members, wives and friends made the Mummer's costumes. Today, however, professional designers and costumers are used. The cost of costuming an average 64-piece String Band, for example, is between \$30,000 and \$80,000, with the captain's costume costing as high as \$10,000.

The Mummers Parade is believed to be the oldest folk festival in the United States. It evolved from many European and early American customs. The Parade's theme song, James A. Bland's, "Oh, Dem Golden Slippers" (introduced in 1903), and the 19th century cakewalk, dubbed the "Mummers Strut" or the "2-Street Strut," came from Southern Plantation musical traditions.

The parade's name is derived from the Mummers plays performed in Philadelphia in the 18th century as part of a wide variety of working class street celebrations around Christmas. Even further back – "Momerie" was a popular amusement between the 13th and 16th century in Europe. Mummers were originally bands of masked people who, during winter festivals, paraded the streets and entered houses to dance or play games.

The parade is televised and now there is also a free computergenerated live stream making this one of the most watched parades in the world, with viewers tuning in from far and wide to watch this spectacular event along with thousands of people lining the parade route itself.


