drawing for one of two \$25.00 gift cards. We had the drawing and the winners of the \$25.00 gift cards were Nancy Gardner and James Brough.


The lucky winner of our 50/50 Drawing was Victor Lopez, who won \$45.

New Year's Eve



One of the biggest New Year's festivities is undoubtedly celebrated in Brazil. "We have a lot of special activities for New Year's Eve." explains Gabriela R. from Rio de Janeiro. "If the city is on the coast, we dress up in white clothes and head to the beach where gigantic fireworks are launched from the water. Then, we jump seven waves making a wish for each one and throw flowers into the ocean to ensure that we have a lucky new."

In Italy it's tradition to wear red underwear and something new on New Year's Eve. It's also really popular to eat lentils for dinner and one spoonful per bell during the clock countdown to midnight. This is supposed to bring fortune, because the round lentils represent coins. "A certain thing is that lots of towns in Italy have their own traditions, for example in the south there is this old tradition of throwing old furniture through the window to welcome the New Year," says Michela B. from Bergamo.



Be Safe on New Year's Eve

New Year's Eve provides an excuse for people to engage in a vibrant celebration. Some people keep their parties safe, watching movies while snacking on popcorn. Others engage in more traditional activities of drinking, lighting fireworks and popping champagne bottles at the stroke of midnight. Whatever your traditions, stay safe during New Year's Eve by being aware of the main safety issues.



Drinking

Many people spend New Year's Eve at a festive party in which people ring in the new year with glasses of champagne. During some parties, people drink vast amounts of alcohol. T o decrease your risk of alcohol poisoning or negative side effects, such as hangovers, alternate each drink with a glass of water. Eat a meal an hour or two before the party and eat a substantial snack every three to four hours. If anyone around you suffers from any of the symptoms of alcohol poisoning, such as vomiting without waking, seizures, passing out and clammy skin, immediately contact a doctor or call 911.

Driving

Never drive drunk or buzzed after a New Year's Eve party. Never get into a car with a driver who is under the influence. Drive extra carefully on New Year's Eve to avoid accidents with people who chose to drink and drive. If possible, leave the party early (before 8 p.m.) or late (after 2 a.m.), or sleep over at the party host's home. If you live in a snowy area and the roads are icy, drive slowly and decelerate early. Avoid slamming your foot on the brake as this increases the chance of skidding.

Fireworks

Although fireworks are illegal in many areas, some people still use New Year's Eve, and other holidays, as an excuse to light fireworks. If your friends are lighting fireworks, maintain a safe distance from the fireworks. Though the exact distance varies depending on the type of firework, 20 to 30 feet should be a safe distance in most situations. Never use fireworks inside, even if they are only sparklers, and never operate fireworks while under the influence of alcohol. Fireworks accidents can lead to burns, property destruction and death in extreme cases.

Guns

Some people engage in the tradition of shooting bullets into the air to celebrate New Year's Eve. Do not participate in this tradition or allow anyone else to do so. When a bullet shoots into the air, it must eventually fall back to Earth. This can cause injury or death. (In 2002 for example, a 9-year-old boy was killed while celebrating Independence Day in Buena Park near Los Angeles from a stray bullet shot into the air.) If someone will not be dissuaded from shooting bullets into the air, force them to use blanks and to participate in an empty area, such as a large, empty field.

Champagne Corks

Popping a bottle of champagne at the exact moment of the new year serves as a tradition for some people. Unfortunately, champagne corks can pop with great force, leading to broken windows or objects or eye injuries. If you chill champagne to a temperature below 45 degrees, this decreases the pressure in the bottle, giving the cork less force when it pops. To pop the cork safely, grasp it with a towel and pull gently. If you feel that it is about to pop, point the bottle downward.
