



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Tubing Down the River on a Summer Afternoon

Tubing the Delaware River has to be one of the best summer outdoor activities you can share with friends and family. Floating down a calm five to six mile stretch of the river in a big rubber tube offers a leisurely way to take in some of the beautiful scenery and observe wildlife along the river banks. Little paddling is required, just relax and let the current pull you along. The water temperature averages in the 80's all summer, the river depth ranges from 1-5 feet, and the water current is gentle.

The object is to start at the top of the run, float for 2-3 hours, and land at a designated terminal spot on the river where the tube rental company has a van that will take water soaked passengers and tubes back to the starting point. There are usually changing rooms, picnic areas, and refreshment stands at homebase.

When tubing first caught on people were given large black rubber inner-tubes. You had to be careful flopping into them as you could get a rubber burn. Some of them had patches that didn't give you much confidence in their reliability

Since tubing has become so popular, however, tube rental companies have become more sophisticated. Now the tubes are colorful custom manufactured with dual and triple chambers for safety and strength, some hefty enough to carry people up to 400 lbs. One company offers a "Snuggle Tube" large enough for two people to float together. It also invented a Tube Hand Paddle that enables tubers to give themselves an extra push should the current slow down. The paddles slide between the tube handles when not in use.

Another company has invented an exclusive "Stay Together Strap" which enables tubes to link to one another so families can safely float together.

Most tube rentals now require life jackets with every rental. These are mandatory for children under 13, non-swimmers, and anyone with a health condition. Children under four are not permitted to tube.

There are two popular tubing companies along the Delaware River: Bucks County River Country, 2 Walters Lane, Point Pleasant, PA 18950, info@rivercountry.net, and Delaware Tubing Company, 778 Frenchtown Road, Milford, NJ 08848, www.DelawareRiverTubing.com.

Due to the popularity of tubing, both companies urge tubers to make a reservation either online or by calling for the day and time you wish to go. Enjoy!!
