



# Did You Know?



"Keep the Ball Rolling" – Meaning to keep things going, to maintain momentum. It comes from the presidential election of 1840, which was won by Whig party candidate William Henry Harrison. The election campaign included the usual pamphlets, buttons, banners and one unique item—ten-foot diameter globes made of tin and leather, which were pushed from one campaign rally to the next.

His supporters were invited to attend rallies and push the ball on to the next town, chanting "keep the ball rolling".

"Beat Around the Bush" – Meaning to avoid dealing with the main issue. In the Middle Ages, people trapped birds for food by dropping a net over a bush and beating the ground around it with a club. As frightened birds perched in the bush tried to fly away, they were caught in the net.




Someone who kept beating around the bush after the birds were trapped never got to the point of the activity—actually getting the birds and eating them.



"Bark Up the Wrong Tree" – Meaning to focus on the wrong object or idea. A hunting term. In Colonial days, pioneers used hounds to trap raccoons and possums. The dogs would chase the animals up trees, then sit and bay at the tree trunk. Occasionally, the hound would get fooled and the hunter would find his pet barking up the wrong tree.

"Smell a Rat", meaning to sense that something is wrong. – In earlier times, it was fairly common for people to have rats infesting their houses. And if a rat died in a place where it wasn't visible, the person who lived in the house smelled the decaying rodent. That's how he could tell something was amiss.

The National Safety Council is on a mission to prevent unintentional injury and death by educating and influencing people to adopt and maintain safe and healthy practices in the workplace, on our roads and highways, and in our homes and communities.

Unintentional injuries and deaths in the United States are at

unacceptable levels. Motor vehicle crashes, falls and overexertion remain leading causes of preventable death and injury. Unintentional deaths reached an estimated 128.200 in 2009, compared with the revised 2008 estimate of 125.800. The 2009 estimate—the highest on record—is 47% greater than the 1992 total of 86,777—the lowest annual total since 1924. The cost of unintentional injuries to Americans and their employers exceeds \$693 billion nationally, or \$5,900 per household, and causes great suffering among individuals and their families.

The goal of National Safety Month is to raise public awareness of safety. June also is an appropriate month to focus our efforts on public safety, as the summer season traditionally is a time of increased unintentional injuries and fatalities. Each week carries a theme that brings attention to critical safety issues. Listed below are the weeks and their themes.

- Week 1 June 1-4 Kickoff
- Week 2 June 5-11 **Preventing Overexertion**
- Week 3 June 12-18 **Teen Driving Safety**
- June 19-25 **Preventing Slips, Trips and Falls** Week 4
- Week 5 June 26-30 On the Road, Off the Phone

Each week during the month of June, the poster and tip sheet for that week will be posted on the plant and office bulletin boards. Take a moment to look over both and do your part to help promote safety.

However, unintentional injuries in the home result in nearly 21 million medical visits on average each year.
