Hard Hat Facts

NEW HARD HATS FOR NEW PLANT EMPLOYEES

The E.D. Bullard Company was a California mining equipment firm founded in 1898 by Edward Dickinson Bullard. Bullard, a pioneer in industrial safety, sold protective hats made of leather. When his son returned home from World War I with a steel helmet, Bullard was inspired to create a safer hard hat. In 1919, he patented a "hard-boiled hat" made of steamed canvas, glue and black paint. That same year, the U.S. Navy commissioned Bullard to create a shipyard protective cap. This commission inspired more industries across the U.S. to start using hard hats for their workers.

Bullard went on to develop the first internal suspension bands within the hard hat that provide more head protection for workers. He also created the first hard hat to protect workers who performed sandblasting. That design covered the worker's face with a window for vision and provided a supply of fresh air via a hose connected to an air

compressor.



Through the decades, hard hats have been manufactured in various materials including metal, aluminum, fiberglass, and thermoplastics. Today most hard hats are made of high density polyethylene or advanced engineering resins. There is now also a color scheme for the hats. White is usually for managers, engineers, foremen or supervisors. Brown is worn by welders and other workers for high heat applications, green often signifies safety inspectors. Earth moving operators often wear yellow, carpenters wear blue. Orange is often used for road crews, and blasters traditionally wear red.



A supply of new hard hats has been ordered to be distributed to new plant employees when they start work at Rex Heat Treat. These hats, manufactured by industry leader MSA, are the V-Gard model, color brown, the standard color worn by workers in high heat environments such as here at Rex Heat Treat. An important fact to know about these hats is that they cannot be written on with markers, pens, or paint. Paint or permanent markers degrades the plastic in hard hats. Instead, labels or masking tape can be applied to a hard hat should new employees want their names written on the hat. Please see a Supervisor if you want to add a name label to your hat.

SAVING DAYLIGHT

Fall back—Spring ahead is the little ditty that helps us remember what to do to honor Daylight Saving Time. We turned back our clocks one hour on November 2, 2016, 2 a.m. Eastern time and we'll spring ahead this year by turning the clocks forward an hour on March 12, 2 a.m. Eastern time.

FYI - it is Daylight <u>Saving</u> Time -- not Daylight <u>Savings</u> Time. Daylight Saving describes Time. At least that's what the experts say is the correct grammatical spelling.



The first U.S. law on Daylight Saving Time went into effect on March 19, 1918 for fuel saving reasons during World War 1. It was repealed after the war. We did not have another Daytime Saving Time policy until 1942 – again due to fuel savings during World War II.

Daylight Saving has had a controversial history. Urban areas enjoyed the extra hour of daylight to encourage shoppers and recreational activities. Rural areas hated it as it meant farmers had less time in the morning to get their milk and harvested crops to market. As a result, a patchwork of times blanketed the country with some states, cities, and even counties honoring daylight saving time, and others ignoring it.

Order finally came in 1966 with the enactment of the Uniform Time Act, which standardized daylight saving time from the last Sunday in April to the last Sunday in October. In 1986, it was moved to a seven month observance, then in 2005 – to eight months which we observe today.

A growing body of research shows there is absolutely no savings regarding fuel consumption as a result of the time change. One wonders why we still do it.

NEW PAYROLL SYSTEM AT REX HEAT TREAT

At the beginning of this year, Rex Heat Treat launched a new electronic payroll system for all employees. We will no longer receive paper payroll stubs hand -delivered at the plant or mailed to employee homes, (except for those who currently do not have email.)


At this point, every Rex employee should have received an enrollment email from ProxusHR explaining how to activate your individual account. The New User Account Set Up Screen gives detailed instructions on how to set up your secure Proxus account and create your own private Username and Password.

Once you have set up your account, you can access Proxus anytime via the url: **proxushr.myisolved.com**


This brings you to a Sign-In screen where you must enter your newly created Username and Password. From here, you have easy access to your *Employee Welcome Page* which contains your employee profile, your individual pay and benefit information, and company contacts.

A user friendly Employee Self Service menu on this page, helps you to navigate the entire site. One of the menu choices is *Pay History*. From that screen, you can both view and print your full pay history and your weekly pay stubs. Pictured are images of the *Employee Welcome Page* and *Pay History* taken from the Proxus site.
