Congratulations! Vindon Griffin Jr., a Furnace Operator in the 300 Group on first shift, is the Improvement Idea winner for the month of October.

Vindon's idea is to install a protective guard or heat shield onto the 440 outlet by 370 furnace. He noticed that when we processed work requiring a fan cool, the hot work would start to melt the protective covering on the fan plug. Many of the jobs are fan cooled from high temperatures.



Installing the shield will protect the plug from melting which keeps the fan operational and minimize the need for Maintenance to repeatedly repair the fan plug.

Did You Know?



In 1836, 24 years before he became president, Abraham Lincoln was the first elected official in U.S. history to favor extending the vote to women. Illinois state legislator Lincoln gave an area newspaper a statement endorsing "female suffrage." In 1920, the Nineteenth Amendment to the US Constitution gave women the right to vote—84 years later!

Prior to the adoption of the Twelfth Amendment in 1804, the candidate who ran second in a presidential race automatically become vice president. Thomas Jefferson became John Adams' vice president in this way.



Two towns in Vermont claim to be President Chester A. Arthur's birthplace, but recent research supports his opponents' charges that he was born in Canada, and therefore, was not eligible to be president under the U.S. Constitution.

Franklin D. Roosevelt is the only President to be elected to the U.S. Presidency for four consecutive terms. After his death, on February 22, 1951, Congress passed the Twenty-second Amendment to the Constitution, which states that a President may only run twice, unless he or she took over from another President with more than two years of term remaining, in which case he or she may only run once.





















Talking Smoke & Carbon Monoxide Alarms

When you turn your clocks back on November 4 to return to Standard Time, be sure to change the batteries in all your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. Also, the alarm units themselves should be replaced every 10 years, for hardwired units, and every 5 years, if it is a battery operated unit.

The newest smoke-alarm units not only monitor for smoke, they can detect carbon monoxide, as well. What's more important, the new devices talk, telling your family in no uncertain words that they need to evacuate and find a way to safety. Kids between the ages of 5 and 10 years old respond better to the voice commands than the shrill beeping of an 85-decibel alarm, which is only 58% effective in waking kids up. Not only are the voice alarms better at waking kids, they are better at keeping them calm during an emergency, especially if the device allows the recording of a familiar voice, studies show. Kids tend to sleep through the beeps of a traditional alarm for some reason. The talking alarm is more likely to wake kids up (96% effective), giving them the opportunity to get out.



Hardwired smoke alarms, which have battery backup, are now required in all new construction. If you are presently relying on battery operated smoke alarms, you may want to consider having them replaced with the new hardwired talking smoke alarms, especially if you have young children. Some units can be wirelessly linked together with the touch of a button, so that if one sounds, they all do. The unit that goes off will also let you know which alarm is sensing. Example: Warning, evacuate! Smoke in kitchen! The new talking smoke alarms cost a little more, but isn't keeping your family safe worth it?
