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Above and Beyond with Lean Overview Training

What did making Lego airplanes have to do with Rex Heat Treat employees? A great deal. This hands-on exercise was part of Lean Overview Training, a three-hour training session that every employee recently attended.

Presented by the Delaware Valley Industrial Resource Center (DVIRC), this workshop focused on the basic principles of Lean Manufacturing. The Lego exercise was one facet of the training that gave attendees a virtual understanding of how production and quality can be improved in a "lean" work environment versus a traditional approach.

In each of the three training sessions held throughout the day and evening, there was a blend of employees from different departments and shifts. "It didn't matter what our jobs were – we were all there for the bigger picture -- to see how we can better serve our customers," noted Greg Bruno, Production Manager.



The employee lunchroom was turned into a work room during the Lean Overview Training. Employees from various departments and shifts worked together to problem solve.

Lean is defined in many different ways but basically it's a systematic approach to eliminating workplace waste and job frustration and embracing value-added activities that improve plant operations and the quality of the product we provide our customers.

The core of the Lean Overview Training hooked on a simple equation: How We Think + How We Work = Results We Achieve.

Through a combination of lecture, video, and simulated exercises, attendees examined ways to answer the following questions: Where do

we want to go? Where are we now? How are we going to reach our goal? To help jump start the thought process, attendees were taught The Improvement Cycle formula: P-D-C-A.

- P = Plan how to establish objectives
- D = Do implement changes
- C = Check measure and compare results
- A = Act standardize to maintain ongoing improvement

"Each facet of the training emphasized how to eliminate waste in our work areas, how to increase overall productivity and performance, and how to help Rex gain a competitive edge in the marketplace," says Scott Wagner, Plant Manager.

"This training and our 5S program are part of Rex's objective to create a companywide culture using lean principles," he adds. Lean Overview Training is the beginning of an ongoing effort to achieve this goal.

October's Full Moon

Some Native American tribes referred to October's moon as the Full Hunter's Moon as it was the time to go hunting to get in meat for the long winter. They would hunt summerfattened deer and fox



unable to hide in now bare fields.

Like the September Harvest Moon, the Hunter's Moon is also particularly bright and long in the sky. It rises just after sunset and sets around sunrise. This is the month when the Moon is in the sky all night long.

Probably because of the threat of winter looming close, the Hunters Moon is generally accorded with special honor, historically serving as an important feast day in both Western Europe and among many Native American tribes.

The Hunters Moon of October is sometimes referred to as the Blood Moon or Sanguine Moon, as the Native Americans named this bright moon for obvious reasons. Other names for this full moon include the Travel Moon and the Dying Grass Moon.

October 24 -- United Nations Day



The United Nations Charter was ratified on October 24, 1945 after several months of negotiations among 50 countries. The Charter was drafted in June 1945 at a conference in San Francisco, California as an international reaction to the devastation of World War II.

The principles of the UN as explained in the Charter are to save future generations from war, reaffirm human rights, and establish equal rights for all people.

"The Charter of the United Nations is a solid structure upon which we can build a better world," said President Harry Truman, who addressed the final day of the conference. "If we fail to use it we shall betray all those who have died so that we might meet here in freedom and safety to create it."

At its founding, the UN had 51 member states; today there are 193. The UN headquarters is in Manhattan. Other main offices are in Geneva, Nairobi, and Vienna. The organization is financed by assessed and voluntary contributions from its member states.

To handle the complex task of getting its member states to cooperate most efficiently, the UN today is divided into five branches.

- **UN General Assembly** is the main decision-making assembly responsible for upholding the principles of the UN. It is composed of all member states.
- The UN Security Council has power to authorize the deployment of UN member states' militaries, can mandate a cease-fire during conflicts, and can enforce penalties on countries when they don't comply with given mandates.
- The International Court of Justice located in The Hague, Netherlands handles all UN judicial matters.
- **The Economic and Social Council** is a branch that assists the General Assembly in promoting economic and social development as well as cooperation of member states.
- The Secretariat headed by the Secretary General provides information and data to other UN branches.

Some of the monstrous global issues the UN addresses every day include terrorism, refugees and migrants, climate change, sustainable development, violence against women, and zero world hunger, to name only a few.

"Throughout human history, in any great endeavour requiring the common effort of many nations and men and women everywhere, we have learned - it is only through seriousness of purpose and persistence that we ultimately carry the day. We might liken it to riding a bicycle. You stay upright and move forward so long as you keep up the momentum,"
