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Use of Metals in Glass Making

On a recent vacation, I had an opportunity to visit a colonial glass making factory in Massachusetts. I was surprised to learn that metals are used to provide strength and color characteristics in glass. In some ways glass making has similar characteristics as that of metal making in that the products start as a molten material, alloying elements are added to produce different strength and color characteristics; and that once glass hardens, it must be tempered so it does not crack.

Early glass factories were set up where there was a ready supply of silica, the essential material for glass manufacture. Silica requires very high heat to become molten. To melt the sand to make glass, the furnace has to reach a temperature of approximately 3,600°F (1,982°C), something furnaces of the time were unable to achieve. So materials (potash, soda) needed to be added to modify the silica network to allow the silica to melt at a lower temperature, and then other substances (lime) added to rebuild the weakened network and make the glass more stable. Only sand of exceptional purity, white sand, is sought to make clear glass.



Quartz sand (silica) is the main raw material in commercial glass production.



Lead crystal ware



Glass is colored by adding metallic oxides while it is in a molten state. Because of the presence of iron in sand, glass with a greenish color mostly results. Copper oxide also produces red and green, cobalt makes blue, and gold produces red glass. Much modern red glass is produced using copper, which is less expensive than gold and gives a brighter, more vermilion shade of red. It was discovered that by adding lead oxide to the glass composition, a far more brilliant, sparkling glass could be produced than had ever been made before. This is called lead crystal.

October 12, 1933 - Alcatraz became a federal prison.

October 14, 1923 - The first mechanical switchboard was installed in the New York City telephone system, and the exchange was called "Pennsylvania."

October 15, 1881 - The first American fishing journal, the *American Angler*, was published in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

October 16, 1958 - The first American objects launched into space were two aluminum pellets lofted by the U.S. Air Force.

October 17, 1829 - The Chesapeake and Delaware Canal was formally opened, linking the Delaware River and the Chesapeake Bay. The canal is fourteen miles long and cost \$2,250,000.

October 18, 1932 - Thomas Alva Edison died at the age of 84 at Glenmont, his West Orange, New Jersey home. At 9:59 p.m., Eastern Standard Time, all nonessential lights in the United States were extinguished for one minute in his memory.

October 19, 1971 - Look magazine ceased publication due to increasing postal rates.

October 21, 1879 - Thomas Edison invented the working electric light.

October 22, 1911 - Airplanes were first used on battlegrounds.

October 23, 1910 - Blanche Scott, was the first woman to solo in an airplane.

October 28, 1886 - The Statue of Liberty was dedicated in New York Harbor by President Grover Cleveland.

October 30, 1938 - Orson Welles performed his, "War of the Worlds" radio broadcast, based on the novel by H.G. Wells, which caused widespread panic

when listeners took as true the realistically performed news reports of an invasion from Mars.

October 31, 1926 - Magician Harry Houdini died in Detroit, Michigan.

Living Room

- Are lamp, extension, and phone cords out of the way of foot traffic?
- Are passageways free of clutter?
- Do small rugs and runners stay put?
- Are curtains and furniture at least twelve inches from baseboard heaters?
- Does your fireplace have a good screen to catch sparks?
- Has your chimney been inspected and cleaned during the past year?
- Has your furnace been serviced professionally in the past year?

Kitchen

- Do you keep paper towels, hand towels, curtains, and other things that can burn away from the burners and oven?
- Are stove tops and counters clean and free of grease?
- Do you turn pot handles inward so that they can't be bumped?
- Are kitchen appliances, such as your coffeemaker, toaster, and microwave, plugged into separate receptacle outlets?

Bedrooms

- Do you have a carbon monoxide detector near each occupied bedroom?
- Is your house or cell phone within easy reach of your bed?
